


In your opinion, did this event create awareness of the mental health impacts of sexual violence?

68 responses




In your opinion, can this workshop help communities be safer and more supportive of survivors of sexual violence?

 Be there for people who have been through sexual assault
 Mental health and sexual assault are a big part of our society. Talk about it
 Be more open at talking about sexual assault
 Ask more questions on how to help/support
 I'm not alone
 To be there for people who have been through this
 Be more aware of how someone is feeling
 There are a lot of resources for me
 Language is powerful, give people space
 Believe and listen, SUPPORT
 How to get help if I or someone I know goes through sexual violence
 It's important to LISTEN to the survivor, and expressing your support
 I am now aware of how serious this issue is
 There are particular actions we can take to be more supportive
 Nothing is universal, people deal with things differently
 We can all do better to help survivors
 How strong Katie was, and how that can inspire others
 Be open to learning from survivors

Learn to accept the difficulties of others
Share how to better support talks by being conscious of our tone/words
If I know someone going through something I better know how to talk to them
Tell my story
I would give people more of my time
To be an ally for those impacted by sexual violence

Stigma, culture
Knowing that you have a safe community

Not being sensitive to others

Culture of power and oppression, rape culture
Peer pressure
Religion, cultural pressures to uphold a specific image
Victim blaming
Misinterpretation
Being afraid to share how they feel
Feeling awkward in not wanting to say wrong thing


How can we improve this event in the future? (Highlights - see raw data for all answers)


